Dear Mr. Nussle:

On behalf of the Alliance for Responsible Atmospheric Policy (Alliance), an industry coalition addressing issues related to the phaseout of ozone-depleting compounds and the implementation of alternatives, I am writing to express our support for a US EPA proposed rule concerning hydrochlorofluorocarbons (HCFCs) that has been under consideration at OMB for many months. A list of Alliance members is attached.


The rule bans the import of products such as appliances after January 1, 2010 that are pre-charged with HCFCs in the exporting country. The Alliance advocated the promulgation of this rule several years ago in various meetings with EPA. We encouraged the Agency to determine that Clean Air Act authority existed to ban the import of such products.

As you know, domestic manufacturers are prohibited from manufacturing equipment after January 1, 2010 that uses new HCFCs. However, there appears to be a loophole that advantages foreign manufacturers who can export such products to the US with HCFC refrigerant already in the product. The Montreal Protocol and US Clean Air Act did not contemplate that foreign manufacturers would be competing in these product sectors when the treaty was negotiated in 1987, and when the Act was signed into law in 1990. The Protocol and Act did not extend the same HCFC-related prohibitions to foreign manufacturers.

While it appears that the Clean Air Act's intention was to achieve phase-down and eventual phaseout of HCFCs, we can find no reason why the Act would have required domestic manufacturers to abide by a manufacturing prohibition that would not extend to similarly imported products.

It is very important that the Bush Administration and EPA send a clear and early signal to the foreign manufacturers that the US import of these products will be cut off on January 1, 2010. We encourage you to complete your review and allow the proposed rule to be published in the Federal Register so that industry can formally express its consensus support for the promulgation of a final rule.
